B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, at a glance:

B. P. Chaliha College, established in 1972 in the sylvan setting of Nagarbera, Kamrup, is embraced by the sweet-flowing river **Jaljali** on the eastern side and a vast expanse of green fields on the western side. The college extends its grasp over two other neighboring districts—Barpeta and Goalpara. The college is named after Assam's former Chief Minister **Bimala Prasad Chaliha**, and it fosters higher education and skill development, especially for the socio-economically disadvantaged, striving for excellence in all areas.

The place Nagarbera occupies a unique space in the rich and myriad cultural heritage of Assam's history, dating back to the days of Ahom King **Gauri Nath Singha**. The huge rectangular tank of Pukhuripara village, Nagarbera, is a living testimony to this fact, situated only a quarter of a kilometre away from the college. The indomitable courage, sense of total sacrifice, dedication, and strong determination of thousands of poor and deprived people of the greater Nagarbera area finally saw their dream come true with the birth of B. P. Chaliha College. With the active initiation of **Late Krishnakanta Sarma**, the then Headmaster of Nagarbera High School, and the unflinching support of the local populace, the college saw its light in the serene atmosphere of Nagarbera High School. In this regard, the contribution of the **Nagarbera Mouza Committee** needs special mention for their pioneering role in making this institution a reality. Due credit must be given to **Late Prabin Kr. Choudhury**, former Transport Minister of Assam, for his unstinting support for this cause. This infant institution started its journey towards eternity with only 135 students and 6 lecturers, stewarded by its founder Principal, **Late Deba Prasad Saikia**.

The college was brought under the grant-in-aid system on 1st September 1979. Another feather was added to its glory when the science stream was introduced in the year 1985. The long-cherished dream of fostering scientific temper and facilitating higher education in the science faculty thus came true when the science stream was brought under the deficit system of GIA on 11th January 1996. At present, the college is a full-fledged one with arts, science, and commerce streams, offering B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. degree courses in seventeen different subjects at the undergraduate level. Except for Computer Science, Sociology, and Statistics, all other departments offer major courses. Following the guidelines of the Directorate of Higher Education and Gauhati University, the college has implemented the **National Education Policy (NEP) 2020** from the Academic Session 2023–24.

Apart from catering to the usual learning programmes of both HS and UG level courses under AHSEC and GU, respectively, arrangements are also made to impart vocational courses and Master's degree programmes in different subjects like English, Assamese, History, Political Science, Education, Economics, Philosophy, Mathematics, and Commerce under **Gauhati University Centre for Distance and Online Education (GUCDOE)**. Students from different locations are already appearing in examinations under this system. A study centre of **K. K. Handique State Open University (KKHSOU)** has been running in our college since 2007–08, which facilitates learning for government service holders, employees of various categories, and college and school dropouts. Provisions are made for their entry into various HS, UG, and PG level programmes under the university.

The college possesses a rich library with a reasonable collection of books, references, journals, and newspapers, freely accessible and with adequate accommodation for research and study. There are three **women's hostels** on the college campus to provide accommodation to 120 female students. It is worth noting that digital classrooms, the internet, Wi-Fi, fax facilities, and other modern technological appliances are also accessible to the students and staff of the college.

Under the active leadership of the college authority, proper guidance of the IQAC, and the dedicated teachers, office staff, and dear students, the greater family has been working ceaselessly to bring the college to a prestigious position by imparting proper and all-round higher education. It inculcates in students a global understanding in general and local importance in particular. Thus, college creates awareness about the community and a commitment to quality and excellence in higher education. The IQAC, being the nodal academic agency, monitors and regulates different activities of cells and committees like the Career Guidance and Information Centre (CGIC), Teaching-Learning Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women Empowerment Cell, Sahitya Kanan, Literary Forum, Science Forum, etc. to promote the intellectual development of students.

We acknowledge our gratitude to all concerned, whose sacrifices have made the college a legend in the academic scenario of Assam. The college has already been accredited with a 'B+' grade by NAAC (National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore) in February 2025 and is now actively preparing for the upcoming cycles of assessment.

VISION:

Regular educational excursions, face-to-face interactions, seminars, symposia, popular talks, workshops, and other initiatives are employed to enhance the academic standards of students and strengthen their presence in the domain of knowledge.

Admission Available for 2026-27 Session

HS (Arts and Science)

B.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, offers a two-year Higher Secondary (HS) course in Arts and Science streams under the Assam State School Education Board (ASSEB).

Subjects offered in the arts stream:

English, MIL (Assamese/Alternative English), Arabic, History, Political Science, Education, Sociology, Economics, Statistics, Mathematics, Geography, and Computer Science.

Subjects offered in the science stream:

English, MIL (Assamese/Alternative English), Economics, Statistics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Geography, Physics, Chemistry, and Biology (Botany and Zoology).

Students at the HS level (Arts and Science) are also allowed to take admission into various self-financed certificate and diploma courses run by different departments or centres of the college.

Note: Apart from the four subjects above, students are required to choose one optional subject from either Agriculture or Bihu, which will be studied in both the first and second

years. In addition, Environmental Science is a compulsory subject in the first year, whereas General Studies is compulsory in the second year.

Note: In addition to the above subject combinations, Environmental Science is a compulsory subject in the first year, while General Studies is compulsory in the second year.

Note: Students can take either Assamese or Alternative English as MIL. Besides the two compulsory subjects, students can take either three or four optional subjects (students are advised to see ASSEB guidelines).

Intake Capacity for HS Level:

Arts Stream: 350

Science Stream: 120

For HS 1st-year (both arts and science) admission, students are advised to go through the ASSEB guidelines and ensure registration through the DARPAN portal. The last date for application and admission is strictly followed in our college as specified by ASSEB through the DARPAN portal.

Gauhati University, Guwahati, and its affiliated colleges have implemented the NEP 2020-led B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. courses from the academic session 2023-24. All these three- or four-year UG-level courses offer both major and minor courses. The college offers all three programmes (B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com.) as per the notification and guidelines of Gauhati University, Guwahati, and the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Assam. The college is bound to accept any alterations or improvements notified by the university and government at any time.

NEP 2020: Some Basic Information

Considering its various components and diverse structure, we present here a few significant points regarding the NEP (National Education Policy) 2020. As stated in the policy document and by Gauhati University, each course under the FYUGP (Four-Year Undergraduate Programme) is broadly divided into two parts:

- (a) Core Courses (subjects) and
- (b) Common Courses.

As the names suggest, students study different core subjects (major and minor), while all students study the same common courses. Below is a description of what students will study under each part in every year of the programme.

First Year (Semester I & II)

Students study two core subjects—one major and one minor—each with 4 credits. One paper from each subject is studied per semester. In addition, students must study a variety of common courses, including:

- Multidisciplinary Courses
- Ability Enhancement Courses
- Value-Added Courses
- Skill Enhancement Courses

Second Year (Semester III & IV)

Semester III:

Students generally continue with the same major and minor subjects selected in the first year, along with more common courses. In this semester, students will take a step forward to study their favourite subject by **declaring** two papers for the **major** subject and another one as a **minor**. Students will have to study a variety of common courses in this semester, which are SEC, MDC, and a VAC course.

Semester IV:

From this semester onwards, students primarily focus on their major subject by taking at least four papers—some of which may be electives depending on the subject.

Note: While the structure remains similar to previous semesters, students may opt to change their major in Semester IV, even if they had declared a major in Semester III—provided there is a vacancy in the new subject.

Third Year (Semester V & VI)

In the third year, students will continue to study the major subject to complete a full set of 15 papers in the major.

Fourth Year (Semester VII & VIII)

If a student proceeds to the fourth year (subject to approval by Gauhati University), they will study advanced courses at a level comparable to the first year of a master's programme. Upon successful completion of the FYUGP, a student can directly take admission into the second year of a master's degree.

Admission into the 4th year of the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP)

- **4-year UG Degree (Honours):** A student who has completed the three years of the FYUGP with a major may enrol for a four-year UG Honours degree in the major subject/discipline. A student with backlog(s) in the previous semester(s) shall be permitted to progress to the seventh semester UG (Honours) degree in the same college if he/she shall have to clear the backlogs within the stipulated chances as stated in the Regulations. The UG (Honours) degree will be awarded after completion of the four-year degree programme with a minimum of 160 credits.

Subjects offering 4th Year FYUGP (Honours) for the session 2026-2027:

Arts:

1. Assamese
2. Education
3. English
4. History
5. Political Science
6. Economics
7. Geography

Science:

1. Zoology
2. Botany
3. Chemistry
4. Economics
5. Geography

Commerce: (Self-financed)

N.B. The course structure to be followed will be as per Gauhati University.

Majors and Minors:

In the case of a bachelor's degree in a stream, a student may either opt for a major and minors or just minors in different subjects. In either case, students must complete a total of **21 courses (equivalent to 84 credits)** by the end of the third year. A **major course** must carry a **minimum of 60 credits**, and a **minor course** must carry a **minimum of 12 credits**. Usually, for most students, the core courses typically consist of one major and one minor.

Common courses:

All students, regardless of their stream or specialisation, are required to study a set of **common courses** totalling **36 credits** over three years. These courses are classified into the following **five sub-categories**:

1. Multi-disciplinary Courses (MDC):

These are **3-credit courses** drawn from **five broad academic domains**:

- i) Natural and Physical Sciences
- ii) Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Applications
- iii) Library, Information, and Media Sciences
- iv) Commerce and Management
- v) Humanities and Social Sciences

These courses are designed at the **Class XII level** and aim to foster holistic knowledge beyond core specialisation.

Each student must select any three papers (each worth 3 credits) from three different subgroups.

During Semesters I to III.

Restrictions:

- A student **cannot choose a multidisciplinary course** if they studied the subject in Class XI or XII.
- The subject **must not** belong to the students' selected **core courses** (i.e., their major or minor).

2. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):

This is an 8-credit course covering Modern Indian Languages (MIL) and English Usage (Communication). Each student is required to complete two papers of 4 credits each – one

from English Usage and the other from the group of MILs, especially designed for the purpose. These courses are to be taken during Semesters I and II.

3. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):

These are skill-based courses with a total credit allocation of 9. A student needs to study the first skill course (3 credits) in the second semester. The remaining three skill papers, each carrying 2 credits, are to be studied during Semesters IV to VI.

4. Value-Added Courses (VAC):

The VAC courses are offered across four sub-groups:

- (i) Understanding India,
- (ii) Environmental Science,
- (iii) Digital and Technological Solutions, and
- (iv) Health & Wellness, Yoga Education, Sports, and Fitness.

Together, these courses carry 6 credits. Each student must take any three papers, each worth 2 credits, from any three of these groups during Semesters I to III. **One paper from the Environmental Science group is compulsory unless** the student is already enrolled in a core Environmental Science course.

Internship (Int)

Students are required to complete a 4-credit internship as part of the programme. The internship is generally undertaken after the completion of Semester IV, preferably during the summer break between Semesters IV and V.

Change of a Major Course:

A student may change their major in the third semester, subject to the following conditions:

1. The new subject must have available seats. This is particularly critical for science subjects due to lab space requirements.
2. Besides, if the student has already abandoned the first year of studying a subject that he/she no longer wants to continue, the student will need to use his/her free credits to compensate for the new subject.

Exit Courses/Conditions:

A student may exit the FYUGP at any stage. Based on the year of exit, the student will receive:

- **Certificate** – after successful completion of Year 1
- **Diploma** – after successful completion of Year 2

- **Bachelor’s Degree** – after successful completion of Year 3

Important: Students exiting after Year 1 or Year 2 **must** complete an **additional 4-credit vocational course**.

The semester-wise final course roadmap for UG-level students, as referred to by Gauhati University, is illustrated with the help of the following organogram.

The performance in the core courses will also determine the grade of the student in the final examinations. The total minimum credit requirement is 84 for the core courses, which translates to 21 courses (papers), with a credit allocation of 4 per course.

Permitted Combination of Courses at B.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera

Based on the NEP 2020 policy document, the guidelines put forward by Gauhati University, and the physical infrastructure available in the college, we have finalised the following course combinations for the session 2026–27. Students need to choose accordingly at the time of admission for B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. While choosing course combinations, students must thoroughly check the prerequisites and course essentials.

B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, offers the following self-financed add-on certificate and diploma courses.

11. Certificate course in soft skills and personality development
12. Fundamentals of Disaster Management
13. Basics of Remote Sensing, Geographical Information System (GIS), and GPS

The above-mentioned courses are managed by the respective departments and open to all current students at the college. Based on availability and permissions, add-on courses are also open to alumni and nearby stakeholders. A few skill-based courses are also in the pipeline to be implemented in the near future at the college.

Sanskrit and Other Vocational Learnings:

SB.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, offers one-year certificate and two-year diploma courses in the **Sanskrit** language under the Non-Formal Sanskrit Education Centre of the college. This is a study centre of **Central Sanskrit University, New Delhi**. One faculty member is also engaged for the purpose. Students can opt for the stated special self-financed course of study in parallel to other courses without having any prerequisite of taking admissions. For admissions, students can check the link available on the college website, or they may visit the Dept of Assamese, B. P. Chaliha College.

Besides, from time to time, the college also offers different vocational courses of study based on the needs of the prevailing situation and local environment. From time to time, the college also offers coaching/classes for different eligibility tests (TET, NET, SET/SLET) and competitive examinations (APSC, UPSC, SSC, Banking, etc.).

Courses under KKHSOU, CDOE GU

B.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, also offers different M.A., M.Sc., and M.Com. courses of study under the Institute of Centre for Distance and Online Education (CDOE) of Gauhati University, Guwahati. Course opportunities are stated below.

1. Master's Degree Courses (Arts, Science, and Commerce Stream):

- a) M.A. in English, Assamese, History, Political Science, and Education.
- b) M.Com.

We offer the above-mentioned courses of study as per the notification and guidelines of IDOL, Gauhati University, Guwahati. Aspirants may visit the college office or the college website to take admission or for any other related query.

B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, also offers different preparatory, B.A., and M.A./M.Sc./M.Com. courses of study under the Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU), Guwahati. We offer the following courses of study:

- (a) B. A.
- (b) M. A. in Assamese, English, Political Science, Education, Sociology, and History
- (c) M. Sc. in Mathematics
- (d) M. Com

Courses are offered as per the notification and guidelines of KKHSOU, Guwahati. Aspirants may visit the college office or the college website for admission or for any other queries.

Admission Procedure:

1) Eligibility Criteria:

i) For the Higher Secondary Course:

A candidate must pass the HSLC Examination of the Secondary Education Board of Assam (SEBA) or any other equivalent examination recognised by the Assam State School Education Board (ASSEB) with a minimum required percentage of marks.

ii) For UG-Level Degree Courses:

A candidate must pass the Higher Secondary Final Examination conducted by ASSEB or any other equivalent examination under recognised boards/universities.

2) Procedure:

- i) **Regarding free admission for APL/BPL students, the government order is applicable.**
- ii) Admission will be strictly based on merit. The selected candidates must get themselves admitted on the specified date of admission, failing which they will forfeit their claim.

- iii) A few seats in each class are reserved for students belonging to SC/ST(P)/ST(H)/OBC/MOBC/EWS as per government rules.
- iv) A few seats in each class are reserved for PWD students and those having outstanding proficiency in sports, music & culture, NCC, NSS, etc.
- v) All applicants must apply online and complete the admission process by visiting the specified websites.
- vi) The following **original documents must be kept ready for verification** during admission/interview:
 - Mark sheets of qualifying examination(s).
 - A character certificate from the head of the institution last attended.
 - Age proof certificate (admit card/pass certificate).
 - Gap certificate (for those who passed the qualifying examination earlier than the current year).
 - Migration certificate (for students migrating from a board/council/university other than ASSEB/GU).
 - Transfer certificate (for students seeking transfer from another institution to this college).
 - Certificate of proficiency from a competent authority (where necessary).
 - Medical certificate issued by the competent authority for the especially abled (PWD) category.
 - Two copies of recent passport-size photographs.
 - Photo of planting at least one sapling (government guidelines are awaited).
 - Ration card/income certificate from the competent authority for availing of free admission.
- vii) The application must be furnished along with self-attested photocopies of the required documents.
- viii) Incomplete application forms will be rejected.

3) Re-admission for students:

A student promoted to HS 2nd-year classes and UG-level classes (except 1st semester) will have to reapply for admission by depositing the necessary fees on a date/procedure notified by the principal of the college, usually within 15 days from the declaration of the result.

Admission of unsuccessful students:

1st-year/semester students of HS and UG-level classes of the college who fail to get promoted to the next higher classes will have to apply for admission along with the fresh candidates. They will not get any preferential treatment for admission to the college. Students detained in a class for two consecutive years will not be admitted to the regular classes of the college. For unsuccessful candidates of HS (final) and UG-level courses, the rules of ASSEB and GU are to be applied accordingly.

Fees for all the courses will be as per the notification issued by the Department of Higher Education, Govt of Assam.

NOTE:

- A student who seeks admission to B.Com. Courses will have to pay Rs. 7000 and Rs. 8000, respectively, as admission and other fees for each academic session.
- Freeships/fee waiver schemes for the session 2026-27 depend on the government notification.
- Students who will take computer science as a subject at the degree level (minor course) have to pay an additional fee of three thousand rupees (Rs 3,000/-) only.
- Excursion/fieldwork fees are to be collected by the concerned department as and when necessary for a programme.
- Students who are not registered in ASSEB/GU are to pay the registration fee.
- The fee structure may change immediately if it is required to change according to the guideline/notification/order of GU/Govt of Assam.

General Rules:

(a) Identity Card and Uniform: A non-transferable identity card will be issued to each student on a notified date. Every student must carry the identity card in a neck-hanging manner while entering the college premises and throughout their stay on the campus. The prescribed college uniform is compulsory for all students. Girls must wear a white kurta, white pants, and a pink dupatta, while boys must wear a white shirt and black pants during college hours and official academic activities.

(b) Attendance: The minimum attendance must be 90% of the number of classes held in each subject in an academic year. A student having attendance less than 90% shall be declared non-collegiate. As per the GU Rule, *internal marks* are awarded to the students for 100% attendance.

(c) Examinations:

For HS Course: Examinations are normally held according to the ASSEB/College academic calendar. A student of the 1st-year class must appear in unit tests, besides the final examination. Final Year students must appear in the test examinations. The promotion of a student or sending up a candidate for the Final Examination will be determined by the overall performance of the student in all the examinations. Absence from any of the college examinations without any valid reason shall be deemed sufficient cause for detaining a student in the same class or not allowing him/her to appear in the final examination.

For UG Course: As per NEP 2020 guidelines under Gauhati University, Guwahati.

(d) College Discipline: Every student of the college shall abide by the disciplinary rules of the college as mentioned below. Any breach of disciplinary rules by a student shall be considered a punishable offence.

- (i) Students seeking admission to the college need to fill out the form in online mode only.
- (ii) The students have to wear the college uniform prescribed by the college authority. They must follow the College Identity Card Rule (4.a).
- (iii) Students are to be punctual in their academic and other college activities.
- (iv) Students are not to be involved in any form of immoral and indecent activities.
- (v) Students are not to resort to any kind of violence.
- (vi) Students are to be obedient to the college authority, teachers, and staff.
- (vii) Students are not to be involved in damaging, defacing, or devaluing any college property.
- (viii) Students are not to act against public sanitation or any act calculated to cause public nuisance, disturbance of public tranquillity, communal trouble, or breach of public peace.
- (ix) Students are not to hold any meeting in the college or hostel premises or the college playground
without prior permission or against the order of the principal.
- (x) Students are not to loiter on the college campus or on the college veranda.
- (xi) Students are not to use any type of unfair means in the college examinations.
- (xii) Use of mobile phones within the college campus is strictly prohibited.

N.B.: A separate soft copy of 'Code of Conduct' is available on the college website.

Support Services:

i) Well-furnished Library:

The college possesses a rich library with a sizeable collection of precious books and journals, including textbooks of various subjects required for usual academic and research programmes. In addition to reference books and periodicals, several newspapers in Assamese and English are also available in the library. Students can avail themselves of a free access facility in the library. All students, teachers, and college staff are entitled to avail themselves of library facilities for their academic and personal development. The use of **Encyclopaedia Britannica** has been a special treat for the students, teachers, and scholars of the Greater Nagaberba area. The library possesses digital facilities for e-journals and e-books. Students should follow the following rules in using the college library:

- a) Students of the HS & UG courses can borrow two books, and especially the students of the major course can borrow three books at a time.
- b) Students should examine the book(s) issued to them before leaving the library counter. If any damage or mutilation in the book(s) issued to him/her is noticed, it should be reported to the librarian immediately. The borrower will be responsible for the loss or damage of any books borrowed from the college library.
- c) Book(s) must be returned within 15 (fifteen) days of the date of issue. A fine of Rs 10.00 (ten) per book per day will be levied if a borrowed book is kept beyond the due date of return.
- d) All books, etc., borrowed from the library shall have to be returned to the library 7 days before the commencement of the summer vacation and 20 days before the start of the examination.
- e) If the library card is lost by any student, it should be reported to the librarian immediately.
- f) Students should not make any noise or talk to each other while in the Reading Room.
- g) Students' identity cards must be produced at the time of borrowing.
- h) The librarian may recall a book at any time in case of urgency.
- i) The authority reserves the right to frame any additional rule(s) as may be necessary from time to time.

ii) Hostel Facility:

There are three girls' hostels within the college campus. The names of the three girls' hostels are Pratima Barua Pandey, Mamoni Raisom Goswami, and S.C. Girls' Hostel. Seats are limited, and admission is done strictly on the basis of merit/distance from the residence of the students. Application forms for hostel seats are to be submitted to the principal of the college. The boarders are to abide by the hostel rules, copies of which will be given by the hostel superintendent. Violation of the hostel rules may lead to expulsion from the hostel as well as from the college. Hostels shall remain closed during the summer and autumn recesses. Boarders must vacate the hostel within 10 days of completion of the examination.

Note: The monthly mess dues must be paid by the boarders within 10 days of the beginning of each month or within the date as notified by the Hostel Superintendent.

- a) **Canteen Facility:** There is a canteen on the college premises, which provides fresh, wholesome food to the students and staff at a reasonable rate.
- b) **Computer Learning Centre:** There is a computer centre in the college to impart computer education to students and staff. The college has started a certificate course in computer applications. Besides the regular students, those who have a minimum HSLC pass and are interested in learning computers can also take admission to this self-financed course. Students are to apply to get admission in the said course through a prescribed form, which is available in the college office. A certificate course in computer education is also available to the students.
- c) **College Magazine 'BPCCIAN':** The college publishes one magazine, 'BPCCIAN', annually. The students, teachers, and other staff members get the opportunity to publish their writings in this magazine.
- d) **Students Aid Fund:** The college has a Students Aid Fund for the poor and meritorious students of the college. Students (in limited numbers) who want to take financial help from this fund shall have to apply to the principal with supporting documents.
- e) **Scholarship:** Students are awarded both merit and other scholarships as prescribed by the govt. of Assam. Besides the govt scholarships, the **Teachers' Unit** awards a certificate of merit along with a cash prize to the students who excel in the UG final and HS final examinations. **The late Bharat Ch. Pathak Memorial Committee** of the college awards a cash prize and certificate to the student(s) who secure the highest marks in Assamese in the H.S. final examination.
- f) **Students' Union:** The college has a general body of students known as the B. P. Chaliha College Students' Union. Its membership is compulsory for every student admitted to the college. The office bearers of the union are elected annually according to BPCCSU's constitution.
- g) **Common Room:** There are separate common rooms for boys and girls. Newspapers, periodicals, and indoor game facilities are available in common rooms.
- h) **College Notice Board:** Students should look at the notice board every day at their own interest for the displayed notice(s).

- i) Fax, Internet & Wi-Fi:** The college has a fax facility for facilitating rapid communication. Internet and wi-fi facilities are also available in all the departments of the college.
- j) Open field for sports facility:** The spacious field of the college is laid out into playfields for cricket, football, kabaddi, volleyball, badminton, etc.
- k) Indoor Stadium:** The indoor stadium of our college was inaugurated in 2023. The facilities provided in the indoor stadium include chess, carrom, table tennis, badminton, etc., for nurturing the hidden talents of the students.
- l) Remedial Classes:** There is a strict mechanism to take remedial classes every semester to assist weak students or slow learners to improve their performance and understand the basic concepts of a course, as well as improve their grades in the final examination.
- m) Free Career Guidance Facility:** A free career guidance facility is provided to the students through the Career Guidance and Information Centre (CGIC) of B.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera. The guidance focuses on helping students to find the right career pathway.
- n) Free wi-fi for all:** Our college provides free wi-fi facilities for students and faculty members. Nowadays, students mostly depend on high-speed internet facilities for their learning. This free wi-fi helps them in online studies.
- o) Availability of Open Learning Sources:** **The college is registered under the SWAYAM platform. Besides, students may make use of different online materials of the college.** From time to time, class notes and videos are uploaded to our website for the benefit of students.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC):

In pursuance of quality maintenance in HE institutions, as it is mandated by the commission and affiliating authority (UGC and university), an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, has been formed in the year 2002. There is a core committee of IQAC (attached herewith). For any assessment and subsequent accreditation with reference to a set of parameters, and to measure the standard of our institution compared to that of other similar institutions, IQAC has been working effectively. Under the umbrella of IQAC, the following committees, sub-committees, and cells (explained under the heading 'holistic endeavour') are formed for the smooth functioning of the institutional quality mechanisms.

- **Curricular Aspects Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with information on how the curriculum design of the institution offers diversity and flexibility to the learners.
- **Teaching, Learning & Evaluation Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the efforts of the institution in providing appropriate teaching, learning, and experiences to learners as well as the efficiency of the methodology of evaluation.
- **Research Innovations & Extension Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the activities of the institution with reference to research, innovations, and extension.

- **Infrastructure & Learning Resource Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the adequacy and optional use of the facilities available in the institution.
- **Student Support & Progression Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the effort of the institution to provide assistance for good students and to facilitate the progression, alumni profiles, etc.
- **Governance, Leadership and Management Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the policies and practices of the institution in matters of planning, human power requirements, training, performance, appraisal, and financial management.
- **Institutional Values & Best Practices Sub-Committee:** This sub-committee deals with the values and unique practices of the institution that add to its academic ambience.

Holistic Endeavour:

The college has uniformly adopted a model of a participatory approach. Each one is necessarily involved in the all-round development of the college. To fulfil the purpose more effectively and to promote integrated growth and development of the students, a good number of *societies*, *forums*, and *centres* have been set up. They are-

1. **Planning Board:** The planning board assesses the overall requirement of the college and prepares plans and estimates as per the funds available/earmarked in the budget.
2. **Library Advisory Board:** This sub-committee deals with the proper management and the overall development of the college library.
3. **Examination Board:** This board controls and conducts all internal examinations of the college.
4. **Inter-departmental Consortium:** The inter-departmental consortium of the college ensures the optimum use and quality enforcement of academic as well as infrastructural aspects of the college.
5. **Research Committee:** This committee acts as a competent body to work for the enhancement of the research culture among teachers and students.
6. **Grievance Redressal Cell:** The grievance redressal cell deals with various grievances of the students as well as the staff.
7. **Alumni Association:** The members of the alumni association are actively associated with the overall development of the college.
8. **Students & Teachers Recreation Centre:** Co-curricular and extracurricular activities are an integral part of education. The college is very much conscious about the matter and provides the facilities and encourages and guides the Students' Union through the '*Students & Teachers Recreation Centre*' in various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

9. **Committee on sexual harassment against women (Internal Complaints Committee):** As per UGC guidelines, a committee on sexual harassment against women (**Internal Complaints Committee**) has been constituted to look into the matter of sexual harassment against women students and employees of the college.
10. **Extension Education Centre:** UGC recognises extension as the third key function of higher education, alongside teaching and research. To connect with the community, our college established an extension education centre in 2002, focusing on informal and non-formal education through awareness programmes, skill training, literacy initiatives, and field-based curriculum development.

To achieve the purpose, our college has the following associations or centres:

1. **Career Guidance & Counselling Centre:** Established in the year 1995, the centre mainly provides orientation to all the newly admitted students. It provides information and guidance and imparts training and conducts seminars and lecture series to develop the professional careers of the students.
2. **Health Care Centre:** This centre takes the initiative to provide all sorts of health and medical aid for the students and staff during the working hours of the college.
3. **Science Forum:** The Science Forum organizes programmes among the students and the local community to popularize science, scientific temper, social awareness, etc.
4. **Women Empowerment Cell:** The women empowerment cell, established in the year 2002, has concentrated its activities towards community mobilisation and the development of women.
5. **Sahitya Kanan:** A literary organisation known as '*Sahitya Kanan*' was established in 1995, and it regularly organises seminars, popular talks, competitions, etc. on various literary, socio-cultural, and linguistic issues.
6. **National Service Scheme:** Established in 1977, the NSS unit of the college provides opportunities for students to render social service both inside and outside the college campus.
7. **Scout & Guide:** The college has a unit of scouts and guides to train the interested students at the college by developing their whole personality to make them leaders in various fields in future life.
8. **Sports Club:** The sports club looks after the infrastructural facilities for games and sports. The club regularly arranges training, workshops, etc. among the interested students for the development of various sports.
9. **Eco-Club:** This club works to create a sustainable, eco-friendly environment on the college campus. The club looks after the conservation of natural beauties and waste management activities.

- 10. Debate Club:** The debate club conducts regular training programmes, competitions, etc., to prepare the students for debates, symposiums, and quizzes.
- 11. Literary Club:** The literary club conducts various literary programmes, competitions, workshops, etc. for interested students for the upliftment of language and literature throughout the year.
- 12. Music Club:** The music club provides facilities for musical programmes/competitions in the campus. It regularly arranges training, workshops, and competitions among the interested students.
- 13. Placement Cell:** The placement cell of the college arranges campus interviews and strives for students' placement.
- 14. Academic Council:** There is an academic council in the college. It includes the departmental heads as members. Members discuss academic plan programmes in the cell.
- 15. NCC:** The NCC cell of the college is working actively. The cell trains all the member students to work for the nation in times of need and emergency.
- 16. Biotech Hub:** This hub is the centre of scientific innovations. They work under the funding of DST, New Delhi. The hub is doing research activities and publishing scientific data.
- 17. Departmental Forums:** Each department has departmental forums. The faculty of the department concerned are the members of each forum. Forums prepare and conduct different plans and programmes for each department.
- 18. IIC:** Innovations and Incubations Centre: A MoE–MIC initiative that promotes a culture of innovation and entrepreneurship among students and faculty. It provides a platform for idea generation, skill development, and startup-oriented activities through workshops, seminars, and innovation programmes, thereby encouraging students to develop creative and problem-solving abilities within the institution.

Anti-Ragging Activities:

B. P. Chaliha College has decided to implement the UGC's full anti-ragging regulations. A few essential sections of the regulations are furnished herewith under the following headings.

A. Objectives of the Regulation:

To prohibit any student conduct—verbal, written, or physical—that causes distress, fear, shame, or harm to another student, especially freshers, and to eliminate ragging in all forms by preventing its occurrence and punishing offenders as per these regulations and applicable laws.

B. What Constitutes Ragging:

Ragging includes any act by a student that causes physical or psychological harm, fear, or embarrassment to a fresher or another student. This includes teasing, rude behaviour, rowdy or disruptive activities, forced tasks, academic exploitation, financial extortion, physical or sexual abuse, public insults, or any conduct—verbal, written, or digital—that undermines a student’s dignity, mental health, or self-confidence. Acts meant to show dominance or authority or cause distress for amusement also constitute ragging.

C. Measures for the prohibition and prevention of ragging:

Institutions must strictly prohibit any form of ragging within or outside their premises, including academic buildings, hostels, canteens, transport (public or private), and affiliated units. No part of the institution shall permit or ignore reported incidents. All necessary actions, as per regulations, must be taken to eliminate ragging.

Strict action shall be taken against those found guilty of ragging, abetting it, or being part of any conspiracy related to it.

To prevent ragging, institutions must:

1. Clearly print anti-ragging regulations in all admission materials (print or digital).
2. Establish an Anti-Ragging Committee headed by the institution’s head and form an Anti-Ragging Squad.
3. Conduct a pre-session meeting involving wardens, faculty, police, local authorities, student representatives, and parents to discuss preventive measures.
4. Spread awareness about the harmful effects and legal consequences of ragging through posters and campaigns.
5. Report details of all privately managed hostels/lodges used by students to local authorities and ensure regular monitoring by the Anti-Ragging Squad to prevent incidents in these areas.
