#### **Post Accreditation Initiatives**

In the first cycle of accreditation, B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera was visited by a three members Peer Team of NAAC on 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> October of 2004 under a very discomforting situation of natural calamity like flood havoc. The college was accorded C<sup>++</sup> grade by NAAC on 4<sup>th</sup> November, 2004. The Peer Team recommended a total of nine suggestions for the college in the interest of providing quality education. The college established the IQAC to ensure quality initiatives. The IQAC of the college sincerely followed the instructions recommended by NAAC Peer Team to carry out the post accreditation initiatives of the college in the interest of providing quality education. The IQAC involved both teaching and non-teaching staff through constituting some units/committee to look into all quality aspects required by NAAC.

In the first cycle of accreditation the Peer Team has suggested the following nine measures to the institution to consider in the interest of providing quality education. Accordingly the IQAC of the college has tried sincerely to follow-up the action of each suggestion given by the NAAC Peer Team one by one as mentioned below.

- 1. More student support services like placement cell, better sports facilities and personality development programmes.
- As of now B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera has introduced different supporting services such as
  - i) Career Guidance and Counseling Cell
  - ii) Students & Teachers Recreation Centre
  - iii) Sports Club
  - iv) Debate Club
  - v) Literary Club
  - vi) Music Club
  - vii) Eco Club
  - viii) Different units like Science Forum under Extension Education Centre.

All these units provide services as resource centre of information, guidance and counselling, personality development, skill development, professional placements and better sports facilities for the students.

2. Possibility of introducing more **self-employment** courses such as physical education, water analysis, mushroom cultivation, disaster management, echo-restoration etc.

Despite the possibilities of opening up the courses like Physical Education, Water Analysis, Mushroom Cultivation, Disaster Management, Echo-restoration etc. the college has not been able to introduce such courses on account of financial and physical constraints. Still our college has introduced three certificate courses each of Six months duration, they are –

- i) Computer Application
- ii) Spoken English
- iii) Human Rights
- 3. Computerization and augmentation of Library facilities and to subscribe more journals and periodicals.
- ➤ Computerization and augmentation of Library facilities are done by
  - i) Installing SOUL II of INFLIBNET
  - ii) Setting up of a digital library
  - iii) Enhancing the number of journals and periodicals.
- 4. Laboratory infrastructure of various departments needs augmentation for quality education.
- > During the last few years the college has enhanced the Laboratory infrastructure of the following departments of the college:
  - i) Department of Chemistry (Extension)
  - ii) Department of Zoology (Extension)
  - iii) Department of Geography (Extension)
  - iv) Department of Physics (Renovation)
  - v) Department of Botany (Renovation)
  - vi) Department of Education (Renovation)

- 5. Language Lab may be setup in the Department of English.
- A Language Lab has been setup in the Department of English to facilitate skill development higher study & research for the students and teachers.
- 6. Department of Music, Art and Culture may be established.
- ➤ Although specific department of Music, Art and Culture have not been setup in our college our pursuit to augment our exercise in the above field are met through Music Club & Literary Club.
- 7. Construction of more buildings for expansion of departments, library, athletics facilities and auditorium.
- > During the last few years the college has constructed & expanded its infrastructure as follows:
  - i) Construction of seven Class Rooms.
  - ii) Construction of three Laboratories.
  - iii) Construction of a new Library.
  - iv) Construction of one Women Hostel.
  - v) Construction of two Toilets.
  - vi) Construction of one Seminar Hall.
  - vii) Construction of one Digital Class Room.
  - viii) Construction of one Digital Library.
  - ix) Construction of one Language Lab.
  - x) Construction of one Meeting Room.
  - xi) Play Ground Development with Fencing.
  - xii) Construction of Boundary Wall.
  - xiii) Renovation of Old Assam Type Building.
  - xiv) Renovation of Girls Common Room.
  - xv) Renovation of Boys Common Room.
  - xvi) Construction of an Indoor Stadium (under construction).
  - xvii) Construction of an Auditorium (under construction).

- 8. Facility for free access to the students in the college library.
- Facility for free access to the students in the college library is available.
- 9. Construction of a Boys' Hostel within the college campus.
- ➤ The college has not sufficient space within the campus to build up Boys' Hostel hence considering the necessity of such hostel for the interest of providing quality education to students the college is searching land in near-by area of the college to construct Boys' Hostel.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This offers much delight to the IQAC in particular and the college family in general of B.P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera, to prepare the self study report to be submitted to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore, for assessment and accreditation shortly. The self study report has been prepared in keeping with the seven criterion laid down by NAAC. Efforts have been made here to highlight the endeavours of the institution for complete and comprehensive attainment in curricular Aspects, Teaching Learning and Evaluation, Research consultancy and extension infrastructure and learning resources, student's support and progression, Governance, Leadership and Management and Innovation and Best practices.

Bimala Prashad Chaliha College was established in 1972 on the bank of river Jaljali at Nagarbera. The college is named after the Ex-Chief minister of Assam Late Bimala Prashad Chaliha an illustrious son and architect of modern Assam. The strategic location of the college at the convergence point of three districts like Goalpara, Barpeta and Kamrup (R) of the State has made it imperative for the institution to cater to the needs of a vast multitude of socio-economically disadvantaged students who aspire to pass through the corridor of higher education. Apart from its geographical importance the place Nagarbera offers a unique reading in the rich and myriad history of Assam since the days of Ahom King Gourinath Singh of 18th century. In its forty two years of glorious march the college has struggled against different odds like perennial flood, poverty stricken populace, remoteness of the place, poor connectivity and lack of adequate resources to tide over its academic and infrastructural needs. The ceaseless efforts, toil and sacrifice of the poor rural mass of the greater Nagarbera area who had to pay five paise more on each K.G. of their ration quota of Kerosine they purchased had at last supplied the life blood for the college for its resurgence and recuperation. The institution has been offering programmes in the field of humanities and Sciences in both U.G. and H.S. level. The college is affiliated to Gauhati University and follows curriculum in degree course prescribed by G.U. That apart H.S. course in traditional and open mode of education is followed in the college prescribed by Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC). In addition to these courses U.G. and P.G. level courses followed by the institution are prescribed and controlled by IDOL, KKHSOU Assam. The college offers short term certificate course on Spoken English, Human Rights and Computer Application. The college received directions from time to time from the affiliating University and institutions. Higher education in humanities is based on human values for

protecting social needs and demands and socio-economic and cultural knowledge. Human skills, Human values and experiment in the practical field, social works etc. are integral part of the curriculum for making higher education extremely important for providing cutting edge. To develop the required practical skills among the students the institution indoctrinates them in to different social works agencies for acquiring techniques of living together which is the cornerstone of present education system. The college maintains perfect coordination with different agencies for effective operationalization of the curriculum keeping in minds the important aims and objectives of higher education particularly the extension aspect. The college now runs 14 Departments both in Art and Science streams having 56 teaching faculty and 33 non-teaching support staff for the smooth functioning that handles the teaching programmes of around 1400 students at present. The efforts of the management, staff and the students of this institution have been remarkably buttressed by alumnae, parents and community at large to bring it to its present status. We are committed in our endeavour to achieve excellence in every possible field by preparing the human resources for the present and future needs without compromising with our vision and mission.

A brief outline of the engagement of the college in different activities has been recorded here criteria-wise in the self study report as below

#### **Curricular Aspects**

The college is offering forteen Under Graduate courses with major and general courses by the Gauhati University in addition to 9 Post Graduate and Under Graduate courses by IDOL. That apart B.P.P. and U.G. courses are conducted in the college in the open learning mode by KKHSOU. Certificate courses in Spoken English, Computer Application and Human Rights are also a part of college curriculum which is self financing and career oriented meant for augmenting the skill of the students. The choice based credit and semester system was introduced in the college by the affiliating university in 2011 which provided greater flexibility, diversity in offering their subjects. The teachers deeply involve themselves in designing and developing the curriculum. Some of the teaching faculties of the institution are active members of the academics bodies of the Gauhati University who take part in the revision and modification of the curriculum. The institution has always been active in keeping a collaborative network with university, research bodies to farther curriculum design for higher studies and research. The goals and objectives of the college are judiciously

integrated to turn the college into a centre of excellence of higher education well equipped with modern technology to meet the challenges of time.

#### **Teaching Learning and Evaluation**

The college follows a transparent admission procedure where each stage is carefully monitored. Different teaching method is adopted according to the needs of the students. Teaching plans and lesson plans are prepared by the teachers for the whole academic session. The college initiates the steps to keep the daily progress report of each individual teacher to review the curriculum implementation and to better future planning in this regards. The teachers availed training programme within and outside the campus to improve the quality of teaching learning. Remedial coaching, peer group learning and tutorial session are arranged to help the slow learners while advanced learners are motivated through multiple intelligent skills. Special care is taken for physically challenged students. Regular monitoring and counseling helps students to improve their academic performance. So far thirteen teachers have completed their Ph.D. and twenty one have completed M. Phil while eight Ph. D projects are still on. As many as 12 MRP have been completed while 1 MRP is still going on. In addition to this, 01 DBT institutional major project is underway. Among the teaching faculty, all teachers have presented paper in National Seminar / Workshop / Conference where as 15 % teachers presented their papers in International Seminars and 0.2 % acted as Resource person in the programmes sponsored by UGC / DBT / SAP / DRS / ICSSR. The college boasts of 40 national and international publications in Peer Review Journal during past few years.

An efficient and continuous internal assessment has been introduced. The academic calendar and the action plan prepared at the end of each year to ensure the smooth conduct of activities of the following years. Adequate attentions are given for the skill development of the students by encouraging their involvement in sports and games, literary composition and allied extracurricular activities. The college possesses a pretty library with a sizable collection of 18 thousand books, 30 national and international research journals. It also makes provisions for free access to e-journals, e-books and ICT facilities. The college facilitates ample opportunity to interact with eminent academicians/scientist who visit the institution. The institution provides support services to the students through extension education centre under IQAC by involving them in NSS, Scout and Guide and Science Forum, Sahitya Kanan etc.

#### Research, Consultancy and Extension

The research and publication committee of the college has been trying over the years to motivate, facilitate and monitor the research activities of the faculty members as well as students. Some of the teaching faculties of different departments are engaged in research activities. The college mobilizes all available funds for research and allied activities. Financial assistance from UGC, DBT and other funding agency are used for providing/upgrading research facilities in the college.

The college has set-up a well equipped Institutional level Bio-Tech Hub with assistance from DBT, Govt. of India. At present 11 (Eleven) faculty members are engaged in active Ph.D. research. Provisions for leave are made by the management for newly registered scholars to attend the course work accordingly. Academic leaves are granted to attend summer workshop and conference etc.

The college maintains a healthy practice of arranging inter departmental talk at regular interval. At least 12 (twelve) Minor Research Project (MRP) has been completed so far till date and one (01) more is still underway.

The extension education centre of the college under takes different programmes in the college campus as well as in the neighbouring schools to create awareness about different subjects among the students and common mass. The basic relevant issues like Science Education, Health Care, Soil conservation, Agricultural & Industrial development and Conservation of Wild life and Environment are deliberated from time to time as part of extension activities by the institution.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The institution provides basic required infrastructure facilities for curricular and extracurricular activities. The Institutional Bio-tech Hub, a state of the Art Seminar Hall, a Computer Lab with necessary Software, Laboratories, New Books and Journals in the Central and Departmental Libraries, Smart class Rooms, Broadband Internet Connection to each departments are some of the learning resources that help faculty and students to keep pace with the latest developments in the fields.

A Separate Recreation Cell is provided for boys and girls to meet their extracurricular activities. A Canteen remains open during the working hours of the college.

A 25 K.V. Electric Transformer is installed in the college campus to provide required amount of Electric power. A 20 Kilowatt Digital Generator is also set-up as the power break-up against load shading to carry on research activities.

The college has two Girls' Hostels, a Warden's quarter, a Principal's quarter and an Administrative Building to support Teaching-Learning process. The college has been equipped with sufficient Aqua guards and a central water supply system to provide safe drinking water to the college community.

One more Girls' Hostel, an Auditorium and Indoor Stadium are under construction. The completition of the Indoor stadium will definitely boost the Sports and Games facilities in the college campus.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

Student support is an essential component of our college functioning because of the rural and socio economically-constrained background of the locality and the students. It provides support services to the students for their benefit through Library facility, Computer lab with Internet connectivity, Digital Smart Class room, Hostel facility (for Girls' only) with laboratories (DBT sponsored Bio-Tech Hub and Star college scheme), Scholarship, Canteen, Poor Students Aid Funds and Sports facilities. The college implements variety of scheme like free admission to the BPL students on merit basis and financial help to BPL students. In addition to Central and State Government scholarships the college offers scholarships for achievers. Career Guidance and Placement Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell provide support services and facilities to students. The achievements of the students in cultural and literary fields are laudable. Miss Debamoni. Basumatari awarded Prize in Folk Songs and Miss Firoza Ahmed awarded Prize in Athletics in the youth festival of Gauhati University in the year in 2011.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

B.P. Chaliha College being the provincialized college as per the provincialisation Act'2005, of Govt. of Assam is to be governed by the defined Govt. rules. The college is affiliated to Gauhati University, Assam and therefore follows the norms and policies of Gauhati University with absolute efficiency and transparency. The Governing Body being the apex body of the college guides monitors and regulates the activities of the college through Principal, IQAC, Heads of all departments, Teaching faculties and all other supporting staff

members of the college. In addition to the existing statutory bodies, different committees/sub-committees are formed to achieve meaningful decentralizing and participating character which is in other way strengthen the feeling of attachment to the institute. It is also very much effective in growing leaders in different steps.

With well defined vision, and meticulously formulated mission, the college is surging ahead carrying with it truth of spirit of Governance and the team spirit among the stakeholders. Regarding academic, construction, financial and student related matters, team based follow up, that is lead team, preparation team and visit team based follow-up is pursued to find the best management.

#### **Innovation and Best Practices**

The college strives to keep a sustainable eco-friendly campus by nurturing the habit of planting trees, keeping the surrounding and self clean among the students, teachers and other stakeholders. That apart, the practice of proper use and conservation of energy, use of renewable energy, use of public address system, waste management, rain water harvesting etc. are religiously followed in an around the institution.

The motto of "Some minute's silents a day keeps all the worries away" is aimed at creating a seren mental state among the teaching faculty, non-teaching staff and students to give better attention to their respective works. This helps in a substantial way to reduce stress, tension, unruly behaviour, and indiscipline inside the college campus. The improvement in student's performance and better proficiency in works are some of its outcome which have reaped rich dividend to the college.

Another thrust area of the college in respect of best practice is "Keep it Clean and Make it Green" which helps creation of a green cover around the institution while maintaining a clean and healthy atmosphere for the growth free mind and sound body among the college family. The students are entrusted with the task of planting trees with the principle of 'One Student One Tree' in the college campus during their first entry into the college. Special arrangements are made to plant saplings of different medicinal plants during the days of national/international importance such as Independents Day, Republic Days, and World Environment Day etc.

#### Major Innovations Introduced in the College

The college facilitates participations and involvement of the students of the highest degree in various institutional activities by phase wise up gradation of the classroom, organizing, seminars, popular talks and workshops in different departments by inviting academicians and eminent personalities from different walks of life. Special emphasis is given to organize extension activity for community development, renovation and development work of the college campus. In addition to the above works some specific measures in this regard are

- Energy Conservation is done through less use of power in college building, laboratories, library, office and classrooms by constructing these building in such a way that it allows natural light and air to enter the room freely.
- Water harvesting: The College has two ponds to reserve water for its use throughout the year.
- Efforts for carbon neutrality: Minimizing the rate of emission of carbon dioxide and maximizing the rate of generation of Oxygen is achieved through composting of garbage instead of burning, plantation and replacing fire wood burning by LPG in hostel and canteen etc.
- Hazardous waste Management by disposing laboratory waste centrally and making the college a plastic free zone.

#### **SWOC Analysis**

#### Strength

- Competent faculties are appointed strictly on the basis of merit and proficiency.
- > The college maintains a seren and creative atmosphere conducive to serious concentrations on learning and research.
- The college is free from politics and external political interference in its functioning. Elections to the student union are conducted in a free and fair manner every year.
- ➤ Members of the Governing Body include eminent and experienced academicians and administrators.
- The campus has the tradition for uninterrupted power and water supply.
- ➤ Eco-friendly living socially responsible citizenship is inculcated in the students through routine activities of NSS, Scout and Guide, Eco-club and other cells and subcommittees of the college.

- > Strong and continuing networking with alumnae, parents and retired faculties through their respective organizations have contributed in a big way to the overall development of the college.
- ➤ The college provides hostel facility to the economically backward girls students in soft financial conditions.
- ➤ Despite recurrent floods during rainy seasons each year the college has made its own arrangement to tide over the crisis by resorting to the strategy of early warning and evacuation of its hostel borders. It also takes care to protect property and instruments of the college by timely action.
- The college is striving hard to set-up a B. Ed. institution in near future.

#### Weakness

- ➤ The college does not possess a Boy's Hostel of its own due to the dearth of adequate land inside the college campus.
- The infrastructural facilities are to be augmented to accommodate the burgeoning number of students every year.
- ➤ Under graduate curriculum of the college provides less scope for serious research work.
- ➤ More faculty members are to be appointed in additional post for the smooth academic transaction.
- ➤ More non-teaching staffs are to be appointed for better management of the college.

#### **Opportunities**

- The very location of the college in a rural area entails the institution to introduce some courses in agriculture at UG level.
- > The multi-ethnic structure of the locality could provide a good scope for research in language and culture.
- The setting up of a Biotech Hub and the Star College status scheme courtesy department of Bio-technology Govt. of India naturally create opportunity to develop life science not only from teaching point of view but also from research point of view.
- > Upgrading the status of some departments of the college to PG department and research centers.

- The gender inequality has been completely done away with in the college by its very nature of being co-educational institutions.
- ➤ The college can be used as a skill development centre for the students and the local youths.
- ➤ Efforts should be made to introduce Commerce stream in college at UG level.

#### Challenges

- Number of working days is inadequate to complete the prescribed curriculum in Choice Based Credit and Semester System.
- ➤ Being an affiliated college, the institution has limited autonomy to design, modify and execute the curriculum the way it is desired for the welfare of the students and community as a whole.
- ➤ The infrastructural as well as the laboratory facilities are to be developed and expanded which needs more financial supports from Govt.al and NGO.
- > The number of teaching faculty and support staffs is to be increased for greater efficiency and management of the college.
- An open air mini stadium inside the college campus is needed to give a big boost to sports and other extracurricular activities.

#### **Future Plans**

- > To upgrade UG to PG in some departments of the college.
- Efforts to convert the best UG department into quality research centre.
- To apply for more UG programmes in vocational and skill development course.
- > To start a physical fitness centre.
- To complete the boundary wall in a stipulated time.
- To construct a Boys Hostel within next few years.
- To construct a well furnished Boys common room.
- > To construct a swimming pool inside the college campus to boost aquatic efficiency of students.
- > To construct a modern state of the Art Teachers-Students Recreation Centre in the college campus.
- To publish a standard Research Journal.
- > To set up an Instrumentation Centre.
- To set up a Skill Development Centre.

#### PREFACE

B. P. Chaliha college, Nagarbera, established on 26th August, 1972, is the first and foremost institution of higher education for the young generation in the entire area of south-western part of Kamrup district, Southern part of Barpeta district and Eastern part of the Goalpara district in the south bank of the mighty Brahmaputra in lower Assam. The college is named after the Ex-Chief minister of Assam Late Bimala Prashad Chaliha, an illustrious son and architect of modern Assam. In its forty two years of glorious history the college has struggled against different troubles like flood, poor economic condition, remoteness of the place, poor connectivity and lack of adequate resources to tide over its academic and infrastructural requirements. Still we are committed in our endeavour to achieve excellence in every possible field by preparing the human resources for the present and future needs without compromising with our vision and mission. The institution has been offering programmes in the field of Humanities and Sciences in both UG and HS level under affiliation of Gauhati University & AHSEC. In addition to these the college provides UG and PG level courses under IDOL & KKHSOU. The college also offers six months certificate course on Spoken English, Human Rights and Computer Application.

The college was brought under GIA system of Government of Assam with effect from 01/09/1979. It has been maintaining consistently high academic standard since its inception. Permanent affiliation for both the Arts and Science Streams was accorded on 04/09/1990 by Gauhati University. The College was recognized under section 2 (f) on 18/09/1991 and under section 12 (B) on 23/04/1992 by University Grants Commission. Further it was brought under provincialized system by Government of Assam w.e.f. 01/12/2005 paving the way for direct control of the state government in matters of service rules of the employees.

B. P. Chaliha college, Nagarbera has constituted the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) on 03/08/2002. The college, was accorded C<sup>++</sup> grade by NAAC on 04/11/2004. The IQAC of the college has been working as per guidelines of NAAC to carry out the post accreditation duties and responsibilities of the college. Accordingly, the IQAC has been entrusted with the task of looking at the areas of concern identified by the peer team, and the suggestions made thereof are being taken care of. However in later course the IQAC of the college prepared the Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) since 2007-08 to 2011-12 and submitted it to the

NAAC on 24/06/2014. The Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) for the year of 2012-

13 & 2013-14 are already prepared and ready to be sent with Self Study Report.

The college could not apply for re-accreditation within the stipulated time due to some

unavoidable circumstances. The unforeseen situation were really beyond the control of the

college. Finally the IQAC of the college prepared the Self Study Report. The preparation of

the present Self Study Report is the result of continuous endeavour of the college in general

and the IQAC in particular. The Governing Body of the college has been very much

encouraging and supportive in this task. Several sub-committees were formed for the purpose

of preparing the SSR and they took pains to collect all the required data and analyse the same

in close consultation with all the stakeholders of the college. It is hoped that the present

report is indicative of the Dreams, Expectations, Endeavours and Performances of the

college. It has been prepared with a futuristic vision keeping in mind the needs of the age in

order to cater to the needs of the present generation.

Now we are going to submit the Self Study Report-2014 of B. P. Chaliha College,

Nagarbera for Reaccreditation (2<sup>nd</sup> Cycle) with due approval of the Governing Body of the

college before the NAAC with expectation of an early visit by the NAAC Peer Team which



The college prepares the daily class routine in the beginning of every academic session for effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum for each programme. Accordingly all the departments distribute the classes to the respective subject specialized teacher. Each individual teacher prepares the required teaching plans and lesson plans for the whole academic session. Moreover the college monitores the daily progress report of each department as well as individual teacher to review the curriculum implementation. Remedial classes have been added to the existing routine for the weak students like- wise provision of special classes are made for advance learner.

The affiliating university and the college itself extends multifarious support and facilities to the teachers for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices. The teachers also present research paper / participate in different international / national / state level seminar / workshop etc throughout the country organized by different universities. Every department has the internet connectivity to avail the learning resources by the teachers as well as the students.

In Science stream each student has required to offer Functional English as compulsory subject and three elective subjects from the list of subject combinations offered by the college. One of the elective subjects may be offered as Major Subject in conformity with the list of subject combinations.

In Humanities stream each student is to study English and MIL (Assamese) as compulsory subjects and two elective subjects from the list of subject combinations offered by the college. From the elective subjects one subject can be offered as the Major subject. In case of the students opting for the major in English or Assamese, they will have to study one elective subject more instead of MIL as per Gauhati University guideline.

The details of the list of the subject combination is published in the College prospectus.

Considering the situation the following suggestions may help the students:

- i) Students should choose Geography major through science stream.
- ii) Combination of Economics, Mathematics and Statistics is highly encouraged.
- iii) Economics major students should be good at Mathematics

The establishment of B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera a small step of an economically backward and geographically remote place has been proving to be a giant stride in the field of life and learning for the rural people. It is 30 km away from the NH 31 & 100 km from the district head quarter under the 48, Boko (SC) of Assam LAC. The place is situated at the convergence of the three districts namely Goalpara, Kamrup and Barpeta in the bank of river Brahmaputra. The transportation and communication system of the area is not up to the mark even to-day. In spite of that, since 1972 it has been spreading the light of knowledge and self-reliance among the huge masses of SC / OBC & Minorities of this area, where it is above 70% of the total students are economically deprived. Presently the college has been working with the mission to make quality higher education available to such economically backward and geographically isolated people of this area to create adequate opportunity for their easy exposure to the National Mainstream.

## **Teaching, Learning and Evaluation**

### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile:

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Every academic year the authority constitutes one admission committee to perform the admission process. The college follows its own procedure in receiving applications and preparing merit list for admission. Initially the college publishes the admission notification in regional News Papers, displaying Banners and Notice Board detailing date of Admission Form issue, submission, counselling and date of admission etc. The Prospectus of the college gives all the details about academic programmes offered, eligibility of candidate, admission process including fee structure and other aspects related to the admission process. The prospectus also provides a brief profile and facilities available in the college. The selection list is announced before the time of admission on the basis of their mark obtained in the qualifying examination. Accordingly the selected candidates are enrolled as they desire.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex.(i) Merit (ii) Common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies(iii) Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution?

The authority forms a Committee naming 'College Admission Committee' well ahead of the admission, which maintains the whole enrolment processes in a very judicious manner. The admission committee entrusted various departments to prepare departmental selection list of the students on the basis of marks obtained in their last qualifying examination and accordingly arrange interview and written test (few departments) and

finalize the list for admission. Since 2012-2013 the college has introduced an office automation software for computerizing the admission process. In the admission process exiting reservation rules laid down by the Government is maintained. The college admission committee maintains all these in a proper manner.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programme offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating University within city /district?

The demand ratio is brightening day by day. Though a large number of application (admission forms) are received by the college ultimately the number of students selected as per the intact capacity of the respective programme. To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled student Remedial Classes are conducted under the UGC Remedial Coaching Programme (RCP) that meant for the students of backward classes, but the College has been to extending the benefit of this programme to general students also as well belonging to the economically poor students. The Remedial Coaching Programme is monitored by the Co-ordinator of RCP.

To sensitize the stakeholders, the college constituted a good number of units which organize different programme such as seminars, workshops, awareness programme, popular talks on different emerging issues e.g. gender inclusion, eco development, human right etc. In this regard it is worth mentioning that the Science Forum, NSS, Women Empowerment Cell, Political Science Study Forum, Economic Forum are leading under the aegis of the Extension Education Centre of the college.

The college prepares one daily class routine with uniform distribution of classes to each departments. The functioning of the college start at 9.00 am and closed at 4.20 pm in every working day. All departments prepare their teaching plan for a session and accordingly each and every faculty member prepare their own lesson plan for the year. The duly appointed Examination Board is empowered to controls and conducts different internal examinations. The scripts are evaluated by the Faculty Members. The Final Examinations are controlled and conducted by the Affiliating University. The evaluation blue print regarding date of examination, scripts evaluation, appointment of examiners etc. are fixed by the affiliating university.

- > The general teaching is made in green-board oriented class room of course audio- visual classes, digital classes are also in practice.
- ➤ Investigatory project, Survey project, Field Study, Group Discussion are regularly assigned to the students.
- > Students are encouraged to meet their teachers to clear any doubts out side the class room also.
- ➤ Collaborative teaching also practised where necessary.
- > The record of student daily attendance is maintained.
- The departments convene open sessions to incite suggestions, to address grievances, and to solve confusion (if any).

### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The institution ensure the stakeholders especially students and faculty regarding the evaluation processes through the following steps:

- > The general rules and pattern of the examinations for different courses are clearly mentioned in the college prospectus.
- ➤ General Orientation Programme is arranged for the fresher's before the commencement of the course.
- ➤ Students and Teachers are advised to visit the affiliated university website regularly to search notices related to the Evaluation Process and Reforms if any.
- > The college Examination Board notifies the examination schedule or any revision / reforms on it well in advance.
- Faculties are encouraged to participate in seminar / workshop and any such programmes organized by the academic agencies.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Previously our affiliating university followed annual evaluation system of the type (1+1+1) offering marks. Since the academic session 2011-2012 Gauhati University introduced Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) system under CBCS pattern where CGPA is offer instead of marks. An Examination Committee is constituted for every session under the guidelines of the University to conduct all the final examinations that controlled by the University. On the other hand all the internal / sessional examinations are conducted and controlled by the Examination Board constituted by the college.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own through the following steps:

- An Examination Committee is constituted for every session under the guidelines of the University to conduct all the final examinations that controlled by the University.
- ➤ An Examination Board is constituted for every session by the college to conduct and control all the internal / sessional examinations.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

In the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) system under CBCS pattern there are two formative assessments of 20% (10% each) and one summative assessment of 80% respectively out of the 100% marks in one semester for each subject of each course. Though it is too advanced to remarks on student achievement because the first batch under this system is yet to pass out still this system has some merits such as:

- The greatest advantage of this system is that it reduces the load on the students and Inculcates regular study habits.
- ➤ Since academic year is divided into 2 semesters it provides upward mobility the Student can clear the backlog in one or many subjects even after moving to the next semester.
- ➤ Best part is that it enables the students to learn at their own pace.
- ➤ Well if one compare it to an annual system, it keeps students busy all the year round with the same level of burden instead of the piling up of work at the end of the year.
- In semester system, Student attach to study through the tear.

- Further Easy learning, attachment to studies, regular class attendance, grip on knowledge, respect for teachers, scheduled work plan etc. are some additional features of semester system.
- 2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The students of each course have to mandatorily appear in different examinations such as Unit Test, Sessional Examination, Semester Examination etc. held in the college.

- ➤ The college monitors & analyses the performance / achievements of the students through Examination Board.
- ➤ The college compare sits Semester Examination results with the results of the University.
- ➤ Each teacher shows the evaluated answer scripts to the students mandatorily for the Unit Test & Sessional Test. Hence given tips for how to score more where required.
- The college provides Progress Report to the students annually.

## 3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research:

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

As it is a UG level institution we have limited fund for research activities. The expenditure against such activities is made from the college fund. Of course the expenditure against other research projects (eg. MRP) are made by granting agencies like UGC, DBT etc.

The board assesses the teaching and learning requirement in both Curricular and Co-curricular activities &Extra Curricular activities periodically,i.e. decides on unavoidable demands and plan and estimate the approximate cost and propose it to the Management for implementation.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The college has specific strategy to keep the teaching and non-teaching staff professionally updated. The IQAC has been entrusted with the task of keeping record of the professional requirements of both teaching & non-teaching staff. Teaching staff are encouraged to participate in Refresher Courses, Orientation Courses, Short term courses under ASC-UGC as well as to present paper in international & national level conference, seminar, workshop etc. organised by competent higher educational organisation. Moreover, the college has been organizing national and state level seminars and Workshops to create an atmosphere of learning, sharing and publication. Regarding the non-teaching staff, the college holds professional development training programmes from time to time keeping in view the professional requirements of the staff.

The college has a mechanism of annual performance appraisal system of both teaching & non-teaching staffto evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal. There is a prescribed proforma for such performance appraisal of the teaching & non-teachingstaff.

The authority of the college reviews annually the performance appraisal reports of the teaching & non-teaching staff and makes required recommendations for better performance, where necessary. These reports are also required for career advancement of the teachers. The authority communicates the annual performance appraisal reports to the appropriate stakeholders for necessary action. For the purpose of career advancement of the staff these annual performance appraisal has to send to the Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. The authority also communicates appropriate stakeholders for better performance in future if the said reports required.

At present the college has no such welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff. But there is a microfinance society named as *B. P. Chaliha College T. E. T. & C. Society* is formed for financial support to teaching and non-teaching stuff of college. All most 99 % of the teaching and non-teaching staff are benefited by the society.

  - The B. P. Chaliha College, Nagarbera was established in the year of 1972. The college was brought under GIA system by the state government in the year 1979. Subsequently the Rules & Regulations, Service Benefits, Service Requirements, Recruitments etc. are necessarily governed by the said Act of the government. Of course, the college family maintains a healthy image for attracting and retaining eminent faculty to the college.

  - a) The B. P. Chaliha College established its Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) on 02/08/2002. Since its inception the IQAC of the college has been trying to act as a nodal agency for initiating and assuring quality in the academic, administrative and other activities of the college. Quality sustenance and enhancement were the two major objectives of the Institution and the IQAC. After creating an academic environment for promotion of quality and accountability, the IQAC has been evolving novel avenues to take the college nearer to its goals and objectives, focusing on the core values identified by NAAC. Within the existing academic and administrative system, the college has evolved mechanisms of its own for the quality assurance. The academic quality of the institution is maintained by the teaching and learning processes. The administrative quality is maintained by the effective functions carried out by the various committees. The main task of IQAC being quality assurance,

planning and monitoring the projects undertaken, it accomplishes through the following:

- ➤ Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher education.
- > Reviewing the existing Programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- > Promoting Research and creating an atmosphere conducive to research.
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning.
- > Organizing Inter and Intra institutional workshops and seminars on Quality related themes.
- > Imparting value based education.
- ➤ Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes / activities of the college.
- ➤ Consolidating the Feed Back responses from students, parents and other stakeholders.
- b) All decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the authority for implementation.
- c) IQAC have three external members on its core committee, a significant contribution have been made by them for the college.
- d) The students and alumni of the college contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC through the student union and alumni association respectively.
- e) The composition of IQAC given in the Table: 6.05. The IQAC meetings for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students through in-house meetings of various committees for effective execution.
- 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The IQAC of the college holds meetings with staff to review the various affairs and activities related to academic and administrative matters of the college.

The college provides training programmes on computer application, office automation etc. for non-teaching staff for effective office management. The faculty members regularly attend training programmes of various kinds to keep themselves updated.

Yes, Institution regularly undertakes Academic Audit and external review. The student's performance analysis is the essential part of the college. The college authority through IQAC aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities such as affiliating university, Government, UGC, NAAC under the existing rules and guidelines even with the local bodies.

Considering the seven criteria of the criteria-based assessment of NAAC, the IQAC of the college constituted different sub committees to look into the core functions and activities of the college for the Quality initiative, Quality sustenance and Quality enhancement. Hence under the IQAC, the Teaching-Learning and Evaluation subcommittee continuously review the teaching learning process.

The college conducts Green Audit of its campus every year in such a way that strengthens the plant – people ratio. The college has enough space for plantation (aquatic & terrestrial plant) to make the campus green.

  - Energy conservation: We believe on the statement that "Energy conservation is the energy generation". Hence the college buildings are constructed in such a way that all class rooms, laboratories, library, reading rooms are getting sufficient light and air naturally which minimize the use of power.
  - ➤ Use of renewable energy: The college has already applied for 15 KW Solar power plant under a scheme of Government of India.
  - ➤ Water harvesting: The college has two ponds in-front of it with a scenic beauty which also play a significant role in harvesting of rain water.
  - ➤ Check dam construction: There is no Dam in the near-by area of the college, so the question of check dam construction is does not arise.

- Efforts for Carbon neutrality: The college makes its efforts for Carbon Neutrality in such a way that minimizes the rate of emission of carbon di oxide while parallelly maximizing the rate of generation of oxygen through
  - i) Replacing firewood by LPG in hostel, canteen.
  - ii) Composting garbage's instead of burning.
  - iii) Plantation.
- ➤ Plantation: Though the college campus comes under highly flood prone area still we are striving against the natural calamity and as on today we have more than two hundred trees of about fifty different species. Besides these, above one hundred saplings of different fruit bearing and medicinal trees are planted last year.
- ➤ Hazardous waste management: The Hazardous waste management system of the college works in such a way that
  - i) Sufficient number of dustbins are placed for deposition of hazardous waste within the campus.
  - ii) The campus is declared as **Plastic Free Zone**, hence use of plastic is strictly prohibited.
  - iii) Laboratory wastes are disposed centrally.
- > e-waste management: Presently we have no such system. Private farms are to be engaged for the purpose as and when required.

# 1. Title of the Practice:

**MEDITATION: A TOOLS OF SUCCESS** 

2. Goal:

"Sarbe Vabantu Sukhinah Sarbesantu Neeramaya"

(Some minutes of 'Meditation a Day' keeps all the worries away)

The humdrum of hectic modern life has afflicted the man with unbounded stresses and worries. The heavy academic claims on the students have made their minds tensed and overburdened. To bring them respite from these maladies, the practice of 'yoga' or 'meditation' is the most effective way out which has been advocated in our ancient scriptures. Meditation integrates material, intellectual and spiritual dimensions of man. It brings bliss and peace of mind. To bring about a focused and serene state of mind of the students before the starts of the day's lesson, each class has to remain in meditative silence at least for two minutes with eyes of the students and teachers close shut. This helps concentration of mind and deep involvement in the lesson for both teacher and students. This small measure undoubtedly brings more success in terms of academic achievement and moral upliftment of the students while creating a holistic enriching academic atmosphere in the college surroundings.

## 3. The Context:

The practice of two minutes silent meditation at 9.00 clock every morning in each class in every working day just before the commencement of the classes for the day is a notable feature which is devoutly followed by the students and teaching community of the college. That apart, periodical meditation classes are conducted by the Extension Education Centre with the help of "Patanjali Yoga Pitha, Boko" for the mental, physical and spiritual development of the students.

#### 4. The Practice:

However, implementing the Yoga like programme in a college is a difficult thing where the students largely belong to various religious and ethnic groups. To develop a

sense of secular attitude towards the programme which looks in surface, like a way of religious practice of a particular community is a challenging task for the college management. But with pragmatic approach and rationalistic explanation of the benefit of such a healthy practice to all the stakeholders the programme become a favourite for all.

The underlying thought and spirit of the programme have attracted the followers towards it in a big way. The whole programme has been designed and implemented by the Innovations and Best Practices sub – committee under the IQAC of the college.

The practice of silent meditation for two minutes, everyday has been followed since the year 2010. This has been implemented with the spontaneous involvements of both the students and teacher community in the programme. This practice is carried on in all the working days of the college at the first class, at 9.00 clock irrespective of subjects. To involve all students at a time in this programme is also a challenge as classes of different subjects do not start at the same time. The cost of arrangements of such programme and remuneration to the resource person sometimes becomes a cause of the worry for the college authority. However for the greater interest of students, and institution strives hard to meet both the ends. Despite the whole hearted efforts in this respect cent percent benefit is not to be realized. But whatever has been achieved so far is not less meaningful then what has not been realized yet.

# 5. Evidence of Success:

Over past five years the success of the programme has been evaluated properly. Every year over one thousand students are inducted into this programme and the consequent academic performances were matched. It is encouraging to find out that the percentage of the successful candidates in final exam has been steadily soaring up while disobedience and indiscipline behaviour of the students has been substantially reduced. From the office record of the principal B.P.Chaliha College, this has been found out that there has not been a single case of breach of law and order in the college campus over the last five years nor have there been any cognizable offence committed by the students detrimental to the interest of the college.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

To implement these programme smoothly we need an infrastructure of a Yoga centre for practising yoga as well as more resource persons are required for imparting knowledge. Financial crunh is a major set-back to this programme. However efforts are made to overcome the problems to sustain the Best Practice.

# 7. Notes (Optional):

The meditation programme which is being implemented in our college is tough and restricted to some extent because of the hetergenous nature of its students community as well as timing schedules. But this will be a bit easier on the part of individual an institution having a fixed time scheduled and homogenious participants. 


